Christmas cards

The first ever Christmas card was sent in 1843 by Henry Cole. He was a very busy man and at Christmas time wanted a quick and easy way to reply to people so he asked his friend, artist John Callcott Horsley to design a card for him. It pictured the Cole family raising a toast.

Although we can still buy cards with children, presents and Rudolph on them, these look very different to those in the shops today - no glitter in sight!

In December 1882 Edward Hibberd Johnson, the vice president of Thomas Edison's Electric Light Company, had the idea of stringing fairy lights on Christmas trees. He had 80 wired lights in red, white and blue on his Christmas tree in his home in New York however these lights, and electricity in general, were expensive so it wasn't until 1930 that the average person would be able to afford Christmas lights.
